

| STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:        | <p><u>The Church</u></p> <p>This is the first and only church which was ever built in Duxbury. On December 18, 1854, at the South Duxbury Schoolhouse representatives from six denominations gathered to form the First Union Society of Duxbury. The participants were: the Congregationalists, Universalists, Free Will Baptists, Protestant Methodists, the Episcopalian Methodists, and the Adventists. Twenty-five names appear on the original subscription list, indicating the pledged money or materials that each would contribute to the construction of the church. The land was donated by C. H. Marshall. Samuel Cook Turner was contracted to build the church. "Slips" or pews were purchased by individual families. "Each denomination could have the number of Sabbaths to occupy the Church in relation to the amount of money paid by each denomination. The Congregationalists had half the Sundays of the year: the Protestant Methodists had the least two Sundays." The church still serves many denominations during the summer season.</p> <p><u>The Church Hall</u></p> <p>In 1890, a community bee was held to construct a meeting hall for a temperance organization known as the "Independent Order of the Good Templar". The land was donated by Mr. Frank Hart. In addition to the temperance meeting, church services were held here when the weather was extremely cold, as well as community gatherings such as the Ladies Aid, and potluck dinners. The original door was in the center, and the side rear entry was recently added as a fire exit. The hall is still used.</p> |  |

DESCRIPTION: This clapboard church rests on a stretcher bond brick foundation. The 2 story Church/Meetinghouse has a gabled asphalt roof which runs East-West toward the road. There is an interior brick rear chimney with a corbelled cap. The 4 bay principal facade consists of two entries each of which has a recessed 7 panel door; separated by a clapboard area. They are framed by a simple narrow surround and share a common cornice. A deck crosses the main entry. Two elongated 8/8 sash with plain surrounds and louvered shutters flank the main entry. Cornerboards frame the building. An octagonal plan louvered belfry on a square base is centered on the east elevation. The spire is topped by an excellent <sup>77</sup> weathervane. Both the South and North elevation are 3 bays with elongated 8/8 sash with plain surround and louvered shutters.

DESCRIPTION:

This church hall rests on a field stone foundation. The clapboard building is 1 1/2 stories, and has a gabled asphalt roof which runs East-West toward the road. There is a rear brick interior chimney. The principal facade (east) is 2 bays wide. On the right side of the main facade is a side entry, with a recessed panelled door with a simple narrow surround. To the left of the door is a 2/2 sash with plain surround. In the gable peak is a 2/2 sash. On the left (south) elevation are 3 bays. There is a recessed panelled and 4 light door with a narrow surround. To the right of the door are 2, 2/2 sash. On the right (north) elevation are 4, 2/2 sash.
